The Vision for Squamish2040 sets the foundation for the Plan. A clear, shared vision defines and brings meaning to what's important for our future.

In 2040, Squamish is a vibrant, inclusive, connected coastal mountain community with a big heart and a small town spirit.

At nature's doorstep, Squamish is a leader and steward, sustaining ecological and human health while supporting resilient neighbourhoods and a thriving, diverse economy for all.

About the Official Community Plan

What is an OCP?

The Official Community Plan (OCP) is our community's **highest level, overall plan for the future**. It sets out a clear vision for how Squamish will grow and develop over the next 25 years and guides decisions on planning, land use, community services, and more.

Why is it important?

Squamish continues to grow rapidly. We have also seen major demographic changes, increasing concerns around climate change and the environment, and shifts in our economy as society becomes increasingly digitized.

The OCP reflects the community's values and priorities as presented through it's vision. By setting out a clear community vision today, we can shape our future growth in a way that is sustainable and provides a high quality of life for current and future residents. This will also offer **greater certainty** for residents, land owners, governments, agencies, community groups and investors about the direction and coordination of the **future growth** of Squamish.

Who uses it and how?

The OCP is used by many. Once adopted, the OCP is implemented by the District through ongoing planning, decisions, actions, and partnerships as guided through annual strategic planning. Progress is monitored and measured over time so we can see how well we're progressing towards our goals.

Policies are **flexible** to adapt to change and **structured** to provide clear direction.

- District Council and staff use it to guide municipal decisions such as budgeting, servicing, capital projects, land use and development proposals.
- Citizens, landowners, businesses, and developers use it to guide **property and investment decisions.**
- The School District and other agencies use it to guide facility planning, program and service delivery.

Key priorities and values that have emerged from community input to date include:

Growth Management:

While protecting sensitive lands and preserving open spaces, we need to carefully manage and focus future growth to avoid sprawl, plan for efficient infrastructure and create complete, connected neighbourhoods where people can live, work, play and shop.

Housing Supply & Affordability:

Strong growth and rising housing prices in neighbouring regions are putting pressure on housing in Squamish and many residents are concerned about being able to afford or find suitable housing in order to stay in the community.

Economy & Local Jobs:

Squamish needs more local jobs to ensure we are more than just a bedroom community. This requires preservation of a range of employment and industrial lands to support a diverse and sustainable economy.

Local & Regional Transportation:

People need safe and accessible ways to get around Squamish and to neighbouring communities. Better options for walking, cycling and transit will help to reduce the need for single-occupancy vehicles and support a more active and affordable community.

Environmental Protection:

Squamish's natural environment is the backbone of our community; it supports natural habitats for fish and wildlife, as well as our own health and wellbeing. Protecting natural areas is essential to maintain valuable ecological services and responsibly manage our recreation, tourism and economic assets.

Community Health & Well-being:

Local food systems, food security, health services, and emergency preparedness are essential parts of a healthy, safe and equitable community.

In 2040...Squamish residents, businesses, organizations, and government work together to adapt to change creatively and collaboratively:

- We are a climate action leader and adapting to the effects of climate change, and our citizens, services and facilities are increasingly self-reliant and prepared for emergencies.

- All citizens are supported and have access to food, housing, community services, and well-paying employment opportunities.
